From Point A to Point B

A Quick Lesson in Using Effective Transitions

Following is an excerpt of a story submitted for consideration to the NYMB series:

I didn't want to make dinner. Pizza sounded good to me. A noise came from the upstairs bedroom. I saw he had fallen out of bed. "We need to put that safety rail back onto his bed so he doesn't do this again," I said to Steve.



What?! Huh?! I don't get it.

That's exactly the response we expect from you, the reader. The story is disjointed at best, written in a haphazard manner and is very confusing.

In storytelling, transitions are mandatory. If a story is being told verbally, the person listening can interrupt the storyteller, asking questions to fill in the missing information. But a reader doesn't have that luxury and must either guess or give up on the story altogether.

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Rumor Control!

Rumor has it that in order to be published in NYMB, you have to use swear words in your story. Nothing can be further from the truth! Our books are similar to a PG13 movie rating or a TV14 rating, and there you will hear occasional swearing. If your story includes a cuss word or two, no problem! NYMB is not a sugar-coated, angel-sweet anthology. NYMB is daring, different and smart! And nothing could be closer to the truth.

From Point A to Point B

Let's break down the example, paragraph by paragraph.

I didn't want to make dinner. Pizza sounded good to me.

Why didn't the author want to make dinner? Maybe she wasn't a good cook? Maybe she hadn't gone grocery shopping in a while? Was she tired? While a transition is not necessarily needed in this paragraph, knowing why the author didn't want to make dinner would help the story.





A noise came from the upstairs bedroom. I saw he had fallen out of bed.

Now the story becomes confusing. Who heard the noise? When was the noise heard? Where was the person when he/ she heard the noise? What about the reference to the "he" falling out of bed. Why was "he" in bed? Who is this person? The last issue is that the author "saw" that "he" had fallen out of bed, but the author never has herself ascending the stairs, walking into a bedroom and seeing what is stated. Maybe she has X-ray vision or is pyshic? That would definitely make the story more intriguing!

"We need to put that safety rail back onto his bed so he doesn't do this again," I said to Steve.

Again, no identifier has been made as to the "he" who fell out of bed. And why is the author all of a sudden now back as part of the action, considering she never went upstairs? Then there's Steve—who is he and how did he magically appear?

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From Point A to Point B

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Read the story again, but this time, it is written using descriptive information to fill in the holes. Plus, we've added much-needed transitions to get the subjects from Point A to Point B:

I didn't want to make dinner. It had been a long day at work, the commute was horrible and when I finally made it home, the babysitter told me she had gotten Jimmy down for his nap later than usual.


I knew our three-year-old would be grumpy and hungry when he woke up, so taking the family out for cheese pizza—which happened to be Jimmy's favorite food in the entire world—sounded good to me.

My husband, Steve, had arrived home a few minutes after me and headed upstairs to change out of his work clothes. Standing in the kitchen alone, I suddenly heard a loud noise come from upstairs. I stood motionless for a moment, looking up at the ceiling. Was that Steve? I thought to myself. But then I heard crying. No, it's Jimmy!

I ran upstairs and flew into our son's bedroom. There was Jimmy sitting on the floor, dazed and crying. He had fallen out of bed-again.

"We need to put that safety rail back on his bed so he doesn't keep doing this," I said to Steve when he entered the room. He had also heard the thump! and thought it was me. But Jimmy's crying told him differently.

Which version makes more sense to you? Which one is more interesting and enjoyable to read? We would hazard to guess your answer is the expanded version.



Before you submit a story, check your transitions carefully. Unless your subject has a fantasy teleporter and that machine is part of the story, make sure you get your subject from Point A to Point B smoothly and seamlessly. Don't leave your reader—and especially the editors at Publishing Syndicate guessing. A seamless story told with creativity and flair has a much better chance of being selected than one with holes and missing transitions.




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Great Ideas from Your Fellow Writers!
